

FURNERMAN AND REGAN REFUSE STRIKERS PERMIT TO PARADE

Mayor and Police Chief Hold Off To Play Politics

When These Officials See That Strikers Will Win Then They Will Step in and Be the "Friends of the Workers" and Offer Services as Arbitrators.

That the Mayor and Chief Regan are siding the department stores in their efforts to keep down the workers cannot be mistaken.

Every store along Main street was supplied with a small army of policemen ready to keep "order," or order the striking men and girls away from the stores.

When the strikers called at the office of the Mayor and Police Chief, neither could be found. It was convenient for them to be somewhere else.

If the Chamber of Commerce had sent a delegate to the Mayor's office the Mayor would have been very much in haste to meet them.

This is the man elected by the votes of the workers to do their bidding.

Chief Regan also found it convenient to be absent, but when he was caught he told the committee to wait till tomorrow, and "I'll see how I feel."

The treatment workers receive at the hands of the political interests of Buffalo.

The waitresses in the restaurants are moving for an organization for a sake of wages and better working conditions. With long hours and the most meagre pay their lot is unenviable.

In most restaurants wage average \$3 a week and tip don't help much.

McKENLEY MONUMENT MEETING.

Four thousand strikers gathered at the McKinley monument yesterday morning. No hall large enough being available, the striking men and girls met in the open under the blue sky and warm sun to listen to the speeches and show their solidarity.

Sam Atkinson, James J. Kelly and Stephen J. Mahoney spoke, telling the strikers to hold firm and victory would surely be theirs.

Thousands of copies of the Buffalo Socialist were sold on the streets by the strikers, and by 11 o'clock a huge crowd had gathered around the monument for love or money. The police permitted the strikers to pass by the monument instinctively to realize that only in the

Capitalist Press Lies to Public to Discourage Strikers

Many of the Stores Closed Down Entirely Yet Daily Press Says Only One-Third of Employees are Out — Only a Few Clerks are Working in Stores That are Open — Women Detectives and Floor Walkers Acting as Clerks.

The Buffalo Socialist has many times said that the daily press of this city was controlled by the Chamber of Commerce and the big advertisers.

Many people have doubted this statement but the present strike has clearly shown that the two morning and the four afternoon papers are controlled body and soul by the store managers and dare publish nothing detrimental to their interests for fear of losing their advertising. Not a single daily paper has told the strikers' side of the conflict except the Buffalo Socialist. For example the owner of Miller's Hall stated there were at least 2,000 people at the Wednesday night meeting. Both the Express and Courier yesterday morning stated the attendance at less than half that figure. It was done to discourage the strikers.

The newspaper publishers of Buffalo have sold themselves for the dollars they receive in advertising from the department stores. Each edition of every afternoon paper yesterday cleverly and skillfully evaded telling the strikers' side. They tied with one another in misrepresentation of the strikers and fattery of the department store managers.
